So it has been a busy time for Mesothelioma UK especially as a huge emphasis over the last 6 months has been around funding. The funding from Macmillan Cancer Support will come to an end in March. Mesothelioma Care in Practice – A GLOBAL FIRST!!

Mesothelioma UK has worked collaboratively with the Royal Marsden School of Cancer Nursing and Rehabilitation to develop a stand-alone course which can also form part of the BSc [Hons] in Cancer Practice or Post-Graduate Certificate in Cancer Practice. The On-line content will be delivered each week for 10 weeks starting from 19 April 2010 to the final week commencing 5 July 2010. The Cost is £750.00 and it will provide 20 credits at level 6 [degree] or level 7 [masters].

When undertaking this course the student will develop an in-depth understanding of the physiology, aetiology and

epidemiology of mesothelioma. This will enable the student to critically explore the diagnostic pathways for patients with mesothelioma and the factors that influence this process. During this module the student will critically examine the skills required to support patients in making complex decisions regarding treatment and care. Integral to the module is critically exploring the knowledge and skills required to assist in managing complex symptoms that this patient group experience. The social context of mesothelioma and the implications for patients and carers will be examined, with particular

reference to care after death. The student will critically explore and analyse current models of service delivery for the care of patients with mesothelioma and examine the impact of these models on patient outcomes.

The "Silent Epidemic" continues to grow: it has been announced that there were 2156 deaths from mesothelioma in 2007, compared to 2058 the year before. Just as surely, the National Centre for Asbestos Related Diseases is rising up the political agenda. Government has indicated that a very strong case has been put forward for funding NCARD, but it will remain to be seen how the ties between the various asbestos issues before them will be pulled together. The most important phase is now lobbying to obtain funding to allow the foundation and future continuity of NCARD. Ensure that your Trade Union Health and Safety Team know about NCARD: we have contacted many but please check. Ask your Trade Union to lobby on your behalf

Asbestos: the hidden danger in our schools

Asbestos is present in around 75% of schools in Britain. Thousands were built between the 1940s and 1980s when asbestos was routinely used in ceilings, wall linings and pipe lagging. In the last 25 years, at least 178 teachers have died from mesothelioma, an aggressive form of cancer linked to asbestos exposure. There are no statistics for pupil fatalities because of the disease's long latency.

School staff unions are very concerned that there is a continuing risk to staff and pupils in schools where little is known about the location and condition of asbestos.

As part of an annual membership survey, **Voice: the union for education professionals** asked about asbestos in members' schools,

and 790 questionnaires were returned from teaching and support staff members in England (other parts of the UK are currently being surveyed). When asked if there had been an asbestos survey in their workplace in the last three years, of the 639 people who answered, 43% said yes, 36% no and 21% did not know. Asked if any asbestos had been removed, out of 262 people, 41% said yes and 46% no, while 13% did not know.

If there had not been any asbestos removed, of the 362 people who replied, only 28% said that they had been told whether there was asbestos, 67% said they had not been told and 5% did not know.

When asked if anyone had received asbestos training, 565 replied, with 23% saying yes, 52% no and 25% did not know.

Voice General Secretary Philip Parkin said: "There are a significant number of schools where staff are not aware of the dangers of asbestos; they do not know where it is and are not involved in its management. How can they be expected not to damage it and to ensure that pupils do not damage it?"

"This survey provides substantial evidence that urgent action is required to improve standards of asbestos management, and to create an action plan for asbestos in schools - including: audits, risk assessments, relevant training and guidance - and for all asbestos to be identified and removed in a phased programme when schools are refurbished."

IIDB – Government ‘Benefit’ Fraud!

It is symptomatic of a fundamental misunderstanding of Industrial Injuries Disablement Benefit that the 2007 consultation¹ on Industrial Injuries Disablement Benefit (IIDB) should ask the question - *"Is IIDB a benefit or compensation?"*

There should be no question at all. The Industrial Injuries Advisory Council explains in the forward to many of its reports that The National Insurance (Industrial Injuries) Act 1946 introduced a new industrial injuries scheme "for paying no-fault compensation".

IIDB is paid as compensation for the adverse effect of an industrial injury or a disease, so that a man suffering from asbestosis receives IIDB for the restrictive effect the fibrosis has on his lungs, causing him breathlessness. Yet, if this man receives a means-tested benefit, IIDB is treated as income replacement

so that the means-tested benefit is lost, pound for pound of IIDB.

In such a case, IIDB loses its raison d'être: it no longer compensates the man with asbestosis for his lack of lung function causing his breathlessness. Instead, it becomes an income replacement benefit. It is treated as income; money to pay for the means to live, such as food and clothing.

Asbestos victims make up the vast majority of those who are paid IIDB each year for prescribed diseases: 77% of all IIDB prescribed diseases put into payment in 2008 were for asbestos diseases. Approximately 17% of asbestos victims receive means-tested benefits and are robbed of their compensation.

It is especially scandalous that mesothelioma sufferers should lose their no-fault compensation, which is paid for loss of their health, and in so

many cases, loss of their lives. In so many cases, mesothelioma sufferers receive IIDB for only a short period of time. To deprive them of compensation is outrageous.

The Asbestos Victims Support Groups Forum UK is campaigning for IIDB to be disregarded in respect of means-tested benefits. The TUC and the All Party Parliamentary Group on Occupational Safety and Health have supported a Forum pamphlet on this issue which can be found on www.asbestosforum.org. Chart 1: Asbestos diseases as a % of all prescribed diseases put into payment 2008

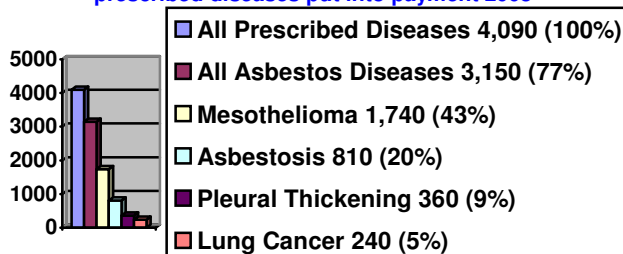
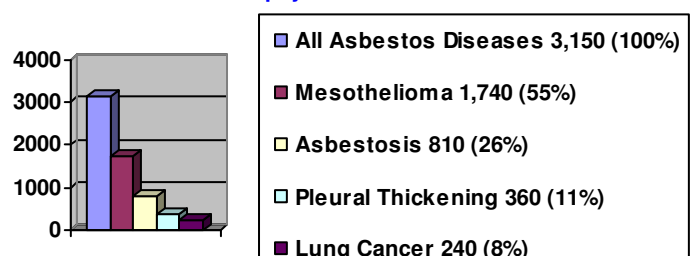


Chart 2: Prescribed asbestos diseases put into payment 2008

Feedback from Chemo-embolisation Session BTOG 2010

Dr Vogl was unable to attend the BTOG 2010 meeting but his colleague Dr Sebastian Lindemayr came in his place to present their experience of treating pleural Mesothelioma.

Dr Lindemayr explained that for pleural Mesothelioma they prefer to use chemo perfusion rather than chemoembolisation as there are less side effects. This allows delivery of the chemotherapy (Mitomycin, Cisplatin and Gemcitabine in this instance) directly to the region of disease.

Between 2007-2010 46 Mesothelioma patients have been treated. Each was not considered suitable for surgical resection and all had

either not responded to chemo or had gone on to develop progressive disease. 39 were followed up. 7 were lost to follow up.

23% (9) responded to treatment with at least a 25% decrease in tumour size. 46% (18) had stable disease and 31% (12) had progressive disease (at least 10% growth). ***this does not include the 7 lost to follow-up.**

Those that responded received a mean 4.3 treatments

Those that had stable disease received a mean 3.05 treatments.

Those that had progressive

disease received a mean 2.6 treatments.

No major complications were reported. 74% complained of pain controlled with mild opiates for several days. 15.4% experienced dysphagia and 18-20% had some G I discomfort. 71.8% were discharged on the same day.

Dr Lindemayr concluded that this is a minimally invasive, low risk treatment with minimal side effects and no complications. He acknowledged the limitations of this presentation given there was no control group to compare findings against.

The Department of Work and Pensions has announced plans to help thousands of people who cannot trace their employer's insurance records to claim compensation.

In a consultation paper the DWP has detailed plans to create an Employers' Liability Tracing office to track down Employers' Liability Insurance Policies and an Employers'

Liability Insurance Bureau providing a fund for those who are unable to trace them.

For Mesothelioma patients who are often diagnosed decades after exposure to asbestos it can often be impossible to trace the insurer as the company may have long since ceased trading.

If the proposed plans were to

go ahead this would provide much help and comfort for those affected by asbestos related diseases.

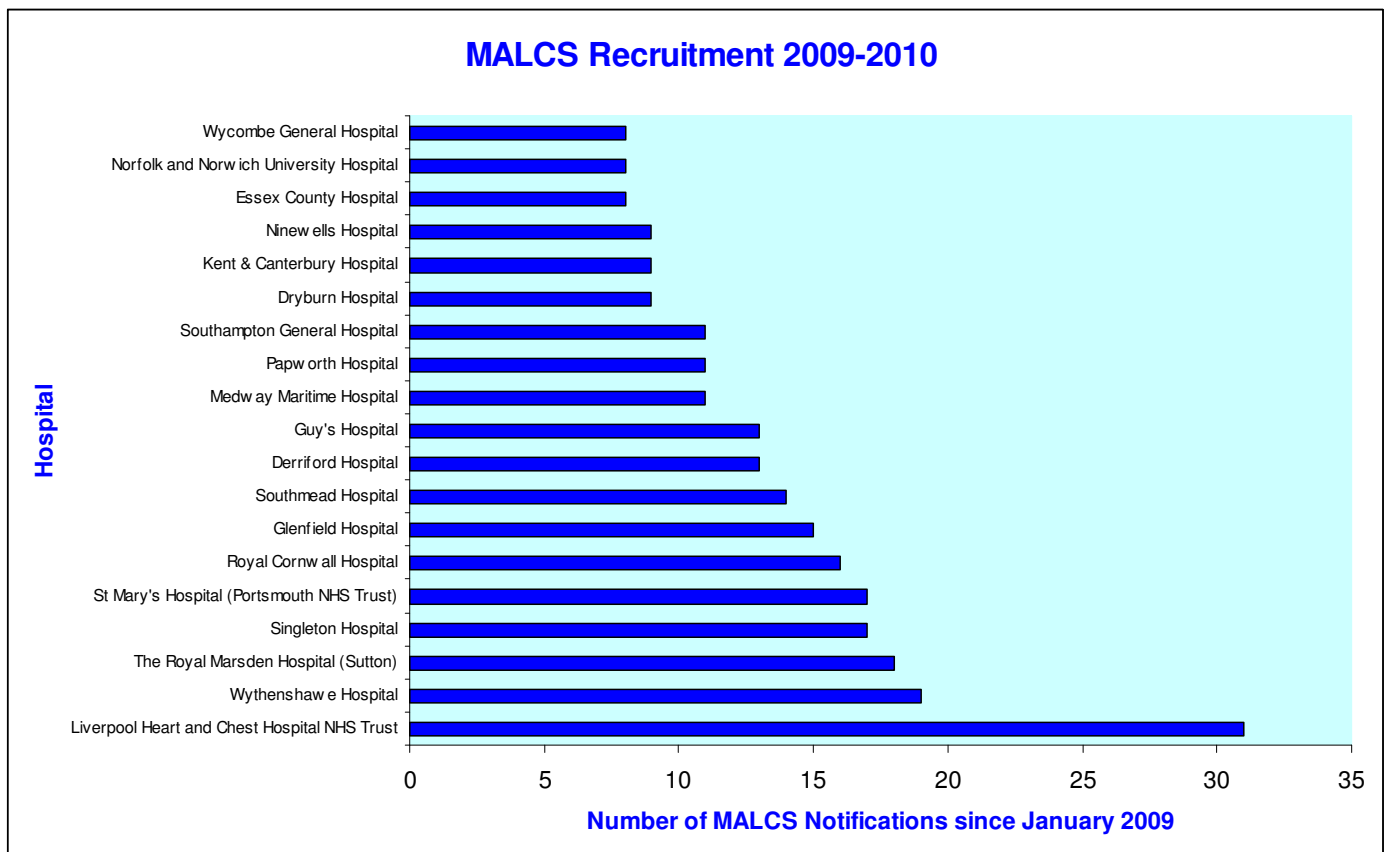
Mesothelioma And Lung Cancer Study – an NCRN postal survey

MALCS was set up to estimate the mesothelioma and lung cancer risks associated with specific occupations across Britain. Data is collected by postal questionnaire. Our analysis of the first 622 mesothelioma patients recruited to this study has recently been published in the British Journal of Cancer (Br J Cancer 2009;100(7):1175-83), and we wish to continue recruiting patients until 2015. This MREC approved study is

SSA exempt, and attracts NCRN funding. Since the second phase of recruitment began, we have received completed questionnaires from 149 male resected lung cancer patients, 208 male mesothelioma patients and 82 female mesothelioma patients. We wish to recruit as many patients as possible to MALCS - the more we recruit, the more accurate our results - there is no recruitment ceiling.

We'd like to say a huge thank you and Happy New Year to all current and past recruiters to MALCS and remind you all that we are still open for recruitment (to ongoing and new sites)

Thank you to these centres and all the other centres who have notified us of patients this year - please keep notifying us of eligible patients. NCRN funding is awarded for every patient notified to us (even if they don't send back the survey).

A note about Lung Cancer patient Eligibility:

We wanted to clear up any potential confusion about eligibility of lung cancer patients to MALCS. Lung cancer patients do **NOT** need to have had their tumour

completely resected to be eligible for MALCS. Any male patient, born on or after 1940, with primary lung cancer who has had **ANY** surgery to remove some lung tissue over and above a small biopsy is eligible.

What does MALCS recruitment involve?

1. Giving eligible mesothelioma and lung cancer patients an information sheet and completing a 1-page notification form

2. Sending the notification form to the MALCS team (SAE's are provided)

There is no monitoring and no further paperwork for you to do. When we receive the form, we write to the patient with the postal survey. The patient returns the survey directly to us at the ICR.

The Inhaled Particles Study (TIPS)

A complementary study to MALCS – please help with recruitment

The Institute of Cancer Research study team are now open again for recruitment to The Inhaled Particles Study (TIPS); a complementary study to MALCS. TIPS will evaluate the risk of mesothelioma to much younger (construction and other) workers. This study will also determine any possible risks from current environmental or DIY asbestos exposures. We are conducting occupational / environmental interviews with pneumothorax patients who have had surgery to remove some lung tissue. We then ask for written permission to examine the small piece of damaged lung removed at surgery to count asbestos fibre burden. This

data will allow us to determine the extent of continuing asbestos exposure due to current working conditions and in the general population. In combination with results from MALCS, this will allow us to estimate the future mesothelioma risks due to current occupational and environmental asbestos exposure levels.

We have obtained MREC approval for TIPS and already have four centres participating in this study (Guy's, The Royal Brompton, Birmingham Heartlands and Cardiff). If you see surgically treated pneumothorax patients and are interested in participating in

TIPS we would be delighted to hear from you. Ideally, we would like to recruit centres that see over 30 surgically treated pneumothorax patients per year. The TIPS study team can assist with LREC and R&D approval (the forms are already completed) and carry out all correspondence and interviewing. The role of each TIPS centre is to help source eligible pneumothorax patients and introduce the patient to the ICR study team.
